With a judging line-up of GCT president Monty Halls, and photographers Tui de Roy and Paul Sansome, this year's competition is shaping up to be the best yet. Not only does the Galapagos Photography Competition celebrate the beauty of the Islands, it also aims to raise awareness of the environmental issues that affect the wildlife and communities who live there.

Monty Halls said, *"It's almost impossible to take a bad photograph in Galapagos - the stark beauty of the islands, the deep blue of the water and equatorial skies, and of course the unique wildlife, make it a photographer's dream.
